

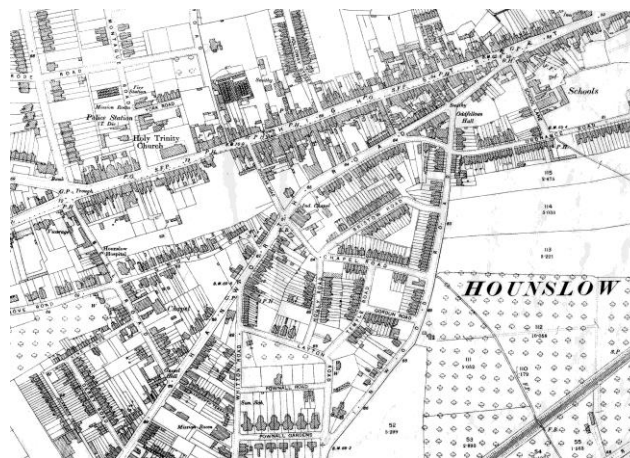
# Ernest Alfred Leonard Lambourne



Ernest Alfred Leonard Lambourne was the son of Blanche, originally from Hereford, and William Lambourne, a 'jobbing' gardener born in Isleworth. He was baptised at St Mary's Osterley on January 9<sup>th</sup> 1898 (see 2016 photo of St Mary's below left) with a home address of 3 Temple Road, Hounslow- (see 1895 map below. Temple Road is parallel with Inwood Road, which borders the orchard areas)



In 1901, he was living in 85, High Street Hounslow, Isleworth with his parents, and brothers- John William (baptised 8<sup>th</sup> February 1891), Frederick Harold

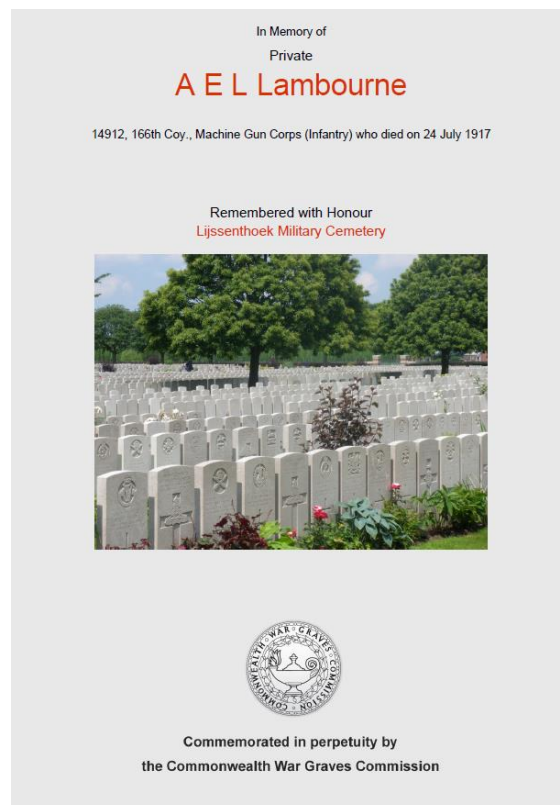


Stanley (baptised 27<sup>th</sup> January 1895) and Reginald Jamieson (baptised 14<sup>th</sup> June 1896). The family moved around residences in Spring Grove and Hounslow. In 1911, the family lived in Kingsley House, London Road, Isleworth. John was no longer living there but the family now included Albert Edward (baptised on 22<sup>nd</sup> February 1903), Cecil Benjamin (baptised 9<sup>th</sup> April 1905), Clara Blanche (aged 4) and Archibald (aged 2). Frederick worked as a messenger and Reginald as a grocer's shop assistant.

Leonard enlisted at Brentford, was involved in action in Belgium and died from wounds on 24<sup>th</sup> July 1917, aged 19. Private Lambourne (14912) was with the Machine Gun Corps (Infantry) 166th Company and formerly the Royal Warwickshire Regiment (14945). He is buried in the Lijssenthoek Military Cemetery in Belgium, which is the second largest Commonwealth Cemetery in Belgium. Leonard's effects were left to his father, William in 1917 and 1919- a total of £9, 9s and 6d. He is also remembered on the memorials in St John's Church, Isleworth and St Mary's, Spring Grove, Osterley.
