

Frederick George Thomas Caines

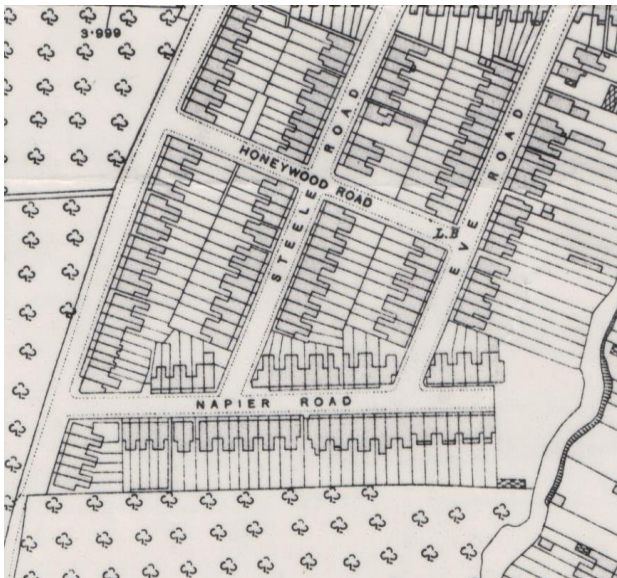


Frederick was born in Windsor in December 1893. In 1901 he was living with his family at The Rise, Sunningdale, Berkshire. Frederick's parents had married in Lambeth in December 1884. His father, Herbert, aged 41 was a railway porter, born in Hazelbury Bryan in Dorset and his mother, Ellen (nee Walker), aged 42 was born in Staughton Moor near Huntingdon. Frederick had an older brother, Reginald Herbert, who had been born in Lambeth and an older sister, Alice Gertrude, born in Clapham. An older brother, George William, was born in 1891 but died aged 6 months. Frederick was born in Sunningdale, as was his younger brother William Lionel. The family also had two boarders who worked on the railways as a plate layer and a painter.

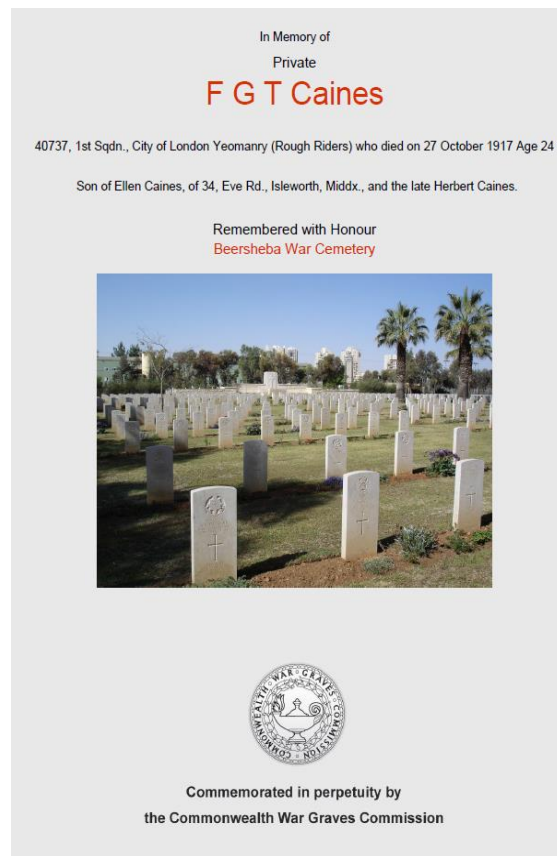
By 1911, the family had moved to 98 Worple Road in Isleworth. Herbert was still working as a railway porter for the London and South West Railways. Frederick, now 17, was working as a butcher and William was at school.

Frederick enlisted in Putney into the City of London Yeomanry (Rough Riders) 1st Squadron as Private 40737 and was posted to Palestine. He took part in the Battle of El Buqqar Ridge and was killed in action on 27th October, 1917. He is buried in Beersheba War Cemetery grave ref N12. His father, Herbert, died in September 1917 aged 57 and Frederick is commemorated as the son of Ellen Caines and the late Herbert Caines of 34 Eve Road, Isleworth. He is also remembered on the memorial in All Souls Church, Haliburton Road, St Margarets.
