

Charles Henry Hankin



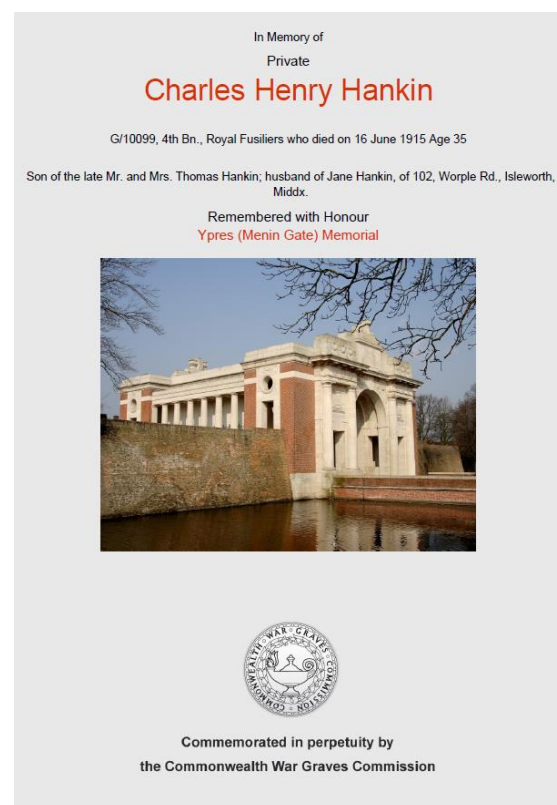
Charles was born in January 1880, the son of Thomas (born in Royston, Cambridgeshire and a coal carter in 1901, and Annie nee Wheatley, born in Isleworth, married 1879). His siblings were: Thomas Edward (b1876), James (b 1878), William (b 1883), Elizabeth Emma (b. 1884), Hubert Henry (b 1886), Emily (b 1888), Edward Walter (b 1891), Ellen (b 1893), Walter Samuel (b 1897) and Annie (b 1902). His father was in Hounslow Hospital in 1911 and died in 1914 and his mother died in 1924. Charles lived in Brickfield Yard, Brentford End in 1881, in 7 Church Alley, New Brentford in 1891 and married Jane Eliza Franklin (b 1879) in 1900 at All Souls Church, Northcote Road. In 1901, Charles (a bricklayer's labourer) and Jane were living at 5 Queens Terrace, Isleworth and in 1911, at 102 Worple Road, Isleworth when Charles was a builder's labourer. Their surviving children were: Victoria May (b 1903), James (b. 1906), William Thomas (b 1907), George Henry (b 1909) and Alice Edith (b1913). Jane died in 1936.

Charles enlisted in Hounslow (G/10099) and served with the Royal Fusiliers, 4th Battalion, (City of London Regiment). He entered France on 2nd May 1915 and was killed in action on 16th June 1915 aged 35 and is remembered on the Menin Gate at Ypres, one of the memorials to the missing in Belgian Flanders. His effects were passed to Jane in 1919 and amounted to £5, 3 shillings and 9 pence. He was awarded the Victory, British and Star War medals. He is also commemorated on the memorial in All Souls Church, Northcote Road, St. Margarets.
