

# George Frederick Hazell



George Frederick Hazell, born in 1886 in Hounslow, was the son of Alfred Hazell, born in Finchley and Emma (nee Petley) born in Suffolk. His parents married on 23<sup>rd</sup> December 1877 in Islington, from families in the building trade. His father was a tree keeper, then a carpenter and George Frederick had five brothers and sisters: Mary, born in 1878; Gertrude Ellen, born 1880, Alfred William James, born about 1885 and an apprentice carpenter in 1901 and a carpenter in 1911, Edith, born about 1889 and a daily servant in 1911 and Florence, born in 1891 and a domestic house help in 1911. George Frederick was an errand boy in 1901 and a landscape gardener in 1911. The family moved from Islington to Harefield, to Hounslow and then to Isleworth. They lived at Elizabeth Cottages, Linkfield Lane in 1891 and 1901; by 1911, they had moved to 120 Linkfield Road. George Frederick married Minnie Ann Cox on February 5<sup>th</sup> 1912 at St John's Church in Isleworth. At the time, both young people, aged 25 were living at 20 Linkfield Road, Isleworth and Minnie's father had been a dock labourer. George Frederick was recorded as a carman.

Driver Hazell (12552) had enlisted in Hounslow and joined the Army Service Corps, the First Cavalry Auxiliary HT (Horse Transport) Company, one of the units responsible for miscellaneous transport services, under command of an Army or other formation HQ in the field. These units would provide food, equipment and ammunition as well as horses and vehicles to enable movement. George Frederick died on 12<sup>th</sup> October 1918 and is buried in the Tincourt New British

Cemetery and remembered on the memorial at St John's Church, Isleworth (right).
