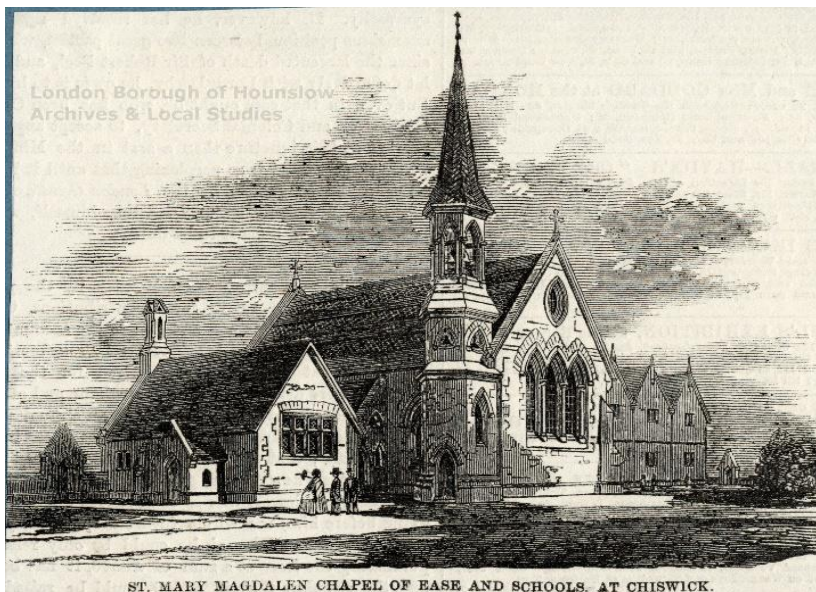


Timothy Moore



Timothy was born in Hammersmith in the second quarter of 1880. His parents, John Moore, a builder's labourer, and Hannah Kelliher (varied spellings), had married in 1876 at St Mary Magdalen Church in Bennett Street in Chiswick. John (C1849-1901) was born in Dingle, County Kerry and Hannah (C1853-1925) was born in Millstreet in County Cork. The family lived in the Chiswick/ Brentford/ Hammersmith area. In 1881, Timothy was living with his sisters, Johanna (8) and Ellen (3) at 25 Hanover Cottages in Hammersmith. By 1891, they had moved to 52 Laundry Road Hammersmith, and Timothy was joined by John (6), Thomas (5), Margaret (3) and Michael, (6 months). In the 1893 Westminster diocese Roman Catholic Census, they were residing at 47 Creffield Road, in the mission of St Thomas's, Fulham. Ironically, the person recording the census form had the same surname as Timothy's mother, Kelleher. By 1901, Timothy's parents and family were living near Dale Street in Chiswick and Timothy had additional siblings: James (9), Mary (7), Frederick (5) and Edward (1). On the 1911 census, when Hannah was widowed and living at 9 Kent Road, Acton Green, she was reported to have had 12 children, 9 surviving by then. Additional details were provided about those children no longer living at the family home.



In October 1900, Timothy married Elizabeth Clack at St Mary Magdalen, Chiswick and by 1911, they were living at 17 Bennett Street, close by. Timothy



was working in the builder's trade as a plasterer. By 1915, the family had moved to 30 Magdala Road in Isleworth. They had five children altogether, who continued to live locally:- John Patrick (1900-1980), a plasterer's labourer when he was living with his mother in 1939; Thomas William (1904-1937), who married Rose Coleman in 1936; Frederick Henry (1908-1957), who married Gladys Annie Dargan in 1935 and by 1939 was living at Crane Avenue, Isleworth, a motor truck driver, in heavy work like his brother Thomas; Ellen Ada (1910-1998), a valve exhaust operator in 1939 when she was living with her mother, she married Arthur Charles Beckett at St Bridget's in Isleworth in 1944; and Alice Margaret (1913-2001) who married Cyril Eric Hugh Burgess in 1933, in 1939 they were living on the Twickenham Road Isleworth, Cyril was an insurance representative and Alice Margaret died in Hillingdon.

Timothy enlisted in Hounslow and served with the record number 3878 with the 3rd Battalion of the London Regiment (Royal Fusiliers). He entered France on 7th March 1915, and just two months later was killed in action on Sunday 9th May. He was awarded the 1915 Star, the British and Victory medals and Elizabeth received his effects. Timothy is commemorated on the Ypres (Menin Gate) Memorial, on the St Mary Magdalen Memorial in St Nicholas's Church, Chiswick and also at St Bridget's Church, Isleworth (see the Memorial above).
