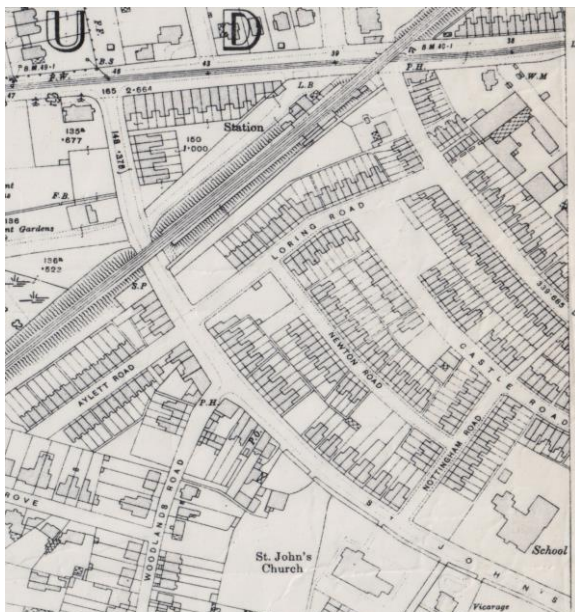


Herbert Henry Nowell



Herbert Henry Nowell, the son of Samuel (a stonemason born in Somerset) and Hannah, born in Biggleswade, was born in 1878 in Bedfont. He had seven brothers and sisters: Ellen, Frederick, Eva, Robert, Joseph, Emma and Albert. In 1901, Ellen, Emma and Albert were recorded on the census as drapers' assistants. In 1907, Herbert Henry, a bricklayer of 2 St George's Terrace, St John's Road, married Mary J Ryall of 5 South Western Terrace on 19th May at St John the Baptist Church. Her father, Henry Ryall, was a stonemason and the witnesses were John and Alice Chambers. By 1911, they were living at 8 Aylett Road, Isleworth.

Henry Herbert Nowell (G/17809) enlisted in Hounslow and served with the A Company, Sixth Battalion, The Buffs. In October 1918, the regiment fought in The Final Advance in Artois, reaching the Scheldt Canal by 27th October. They were withdrawn for rest on 30th October and moved to east of Douai, where they were engaged in battlefield salvage until demobilisation began. Henry Herbert Nowell was killed in action on 23rd October 1918 aged 40. He is also remembered on the memorial in St John the Baptist Church in Isleworth.
