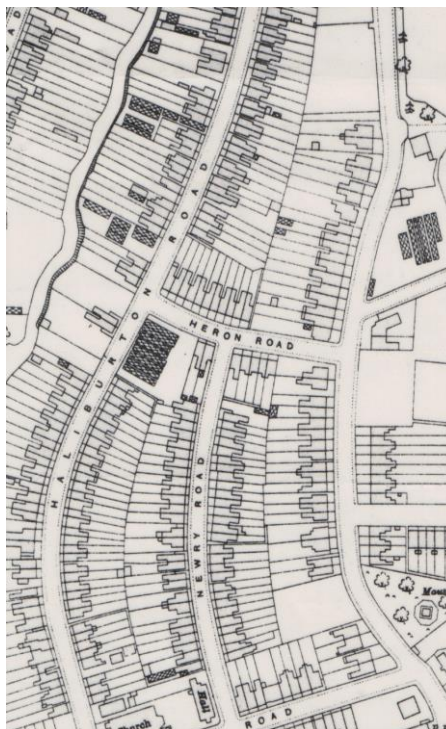


John Pincham



John Pincham was the son of Joseph Pincham, a domestic gardener, originally from Wandsworth, Surrey, and Susan Pincham formerly Wills, from Devon. He was born on 30th May 1881 at 21 Alexandra Road, Richmond and had five brothers and sisters: William, recorded as an errand boy in 1891, then a barman in 1901; Susan; Joseph, a carpet layer, who served with the East Surreys; Sarah, and Robert, a gardener (1901), then a carman (1915), who served with the Royal Engineers. In 1891, John was living at 2 Springfield Terrace, Mortlake and in 1901, as a barman at the Reindeer public house in Peckham. John married Beatrice Palmer on 26th March 1905 at the Parish Church Richmond. They had 5 children - Stanley, Constance, Richard, John and Albert and lived at 44 Haliburton Road, Isleworth. He worked as a gardener at Doughty House Richmond.

John enlisted in Twickenham and joined the 32nd Battalion Royal Fusiliers (City of London Regiment) in the line on 12th October 1916 at Becordel Camp. He fought in France and Belgium - the Western European Theatre of War and was killed in action between the dates of 19th - 22nd September 1917 during the Battle for the Menin Road, during the Third Battle of Ypres. He is remembered at Tyne Cot Cemetery, Belgium (see below), which bears the

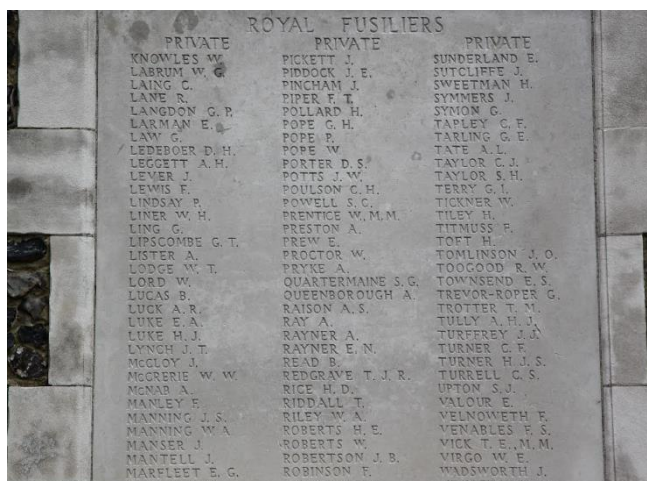
names of 35,000 officers and men whose graves are not known. He is also remembered at All Souls Church, St Margarets.
